



SASKATOON TRIVIA

Saskatoon is named after mis-sask-quah-toomina, the Cree indian name for the local Saskatoon berry - a sweet, violet coloured berry that grows wild.

The lowest temperature ever recorded in Saskatoon was -50C in 1893. The coldest temperature with windchill was -60.9C.

The only earthquake ever recorded in Saskatoon was on May 15th 1909 and it lasted about 30 seconds.

Larry and Shirley purchased the business on 23^d Street West with no more than 600 square feet to work out of. The building is original to Saskatoon and was built in 1921 as a White Rose gas station. The building was then changed into a Speedy Auto Glass before finally becoming LB Signs. In 1982 Larry and Shirley added onto the original building in order to fit vehicles of larger sizes, including semi trucks.

Since 1974, the business has grown, but has remained in the original location. There have been many changes throughout the years, but it has pleasantly remained a family owned and operated business. Currently there are three generations working together, along with non-family staff (although we consider them family!) who work well together, while continuing to create the original vision Larry and Shirley had.

Throughout the years, LB Signs has contributed to and supported various communities in Saskatoon. LB Signs has been involved in: The Denny Carr's Secret Santa Foundation, Precision Auto Body Wish Car Give Away, Draggin's Car Show (Camp Easter Seal), Saskatchewan Hall of Fame, Saskatchewan Ladies Curling Classic, Saskatchewan International Raceway, Bridge City Speedway, a variety of hockey clubs, elementary schools, high school work education programs, and more.

Why is a teddy bear never hungry? Their always stuffed . . .

What's the music that balloons just cringe at? POP!

While **Wolf Willow** is a residential community within the King George area it is originally an actual plant used by some of the first people's of this land. The flowers are very fragrant and the beautiful striped seed used in artworks. The berries were boiled to remove the flesh and the pointed nutlets strung to make necklaces, or used to decorate the fringes of clothing. When settlers arrived they learned the art from the First Nations people and Wolf Willow products became a popular gift to send home.

Wolf Willow fruit is mealy and dry but was still eaten by some First Nations. The berries were mixed with grease and stored in cool places. This was then added to soups and broths like barley is today. The berries were sometimes mixed with blood or sweet sap and cooked for food. People suffering from frostbite were treated with a strong solution made from the bark. The bark was also used to construct strong fibre baskets handy for a number of uses. Strong observational skills allowed the first people's to comprehend the many uses of the products nature provides, understanding medicinal, food value and construction of useful products. Today the essential oil of Wolf Willow is in demand for aromatherapy.

King George History

The King George neighbourhood is located on the west side of the **beautiful** south Saskatchewan River. The area was surveyed in 1907 and was originally named Riverview for good reason! Homes along Avenue H in this historic neighbourhood are afforded **majestic** views of Victoria Park and the calming **beauty** of the river itself. A short walk takes you into the **park** or the river shore. There are plenty of spots to sit in quiet **contemplation** tasting the fragrant, sweet air of the many varying **trees** giving shade and shelter when needed. It's boundary includes the west portion of Spadina along **Victoria Park**, 11th Street, Avenue P and 17th Street. The name was changed around 1929 to incorporate the name of, at that time, the new public school. This historic school in which **famed** hockey legend **Gordie Howe** attended still stands, an example of the design and strength of structures and people built in that era:) Today to the west of Victoria Park a variety of **fantastic** merchants present **tasty** treats and the art of **relaxation** to match any mood the park or life presents, from **meatball** subs to **yoga!** Welcome to the **trendy** neighbourhood of King George!
